It seems as though it was a couple weeks ago that I became President of The Sons & Daughters of Hawley (SDH). But it was actually August 8, 2010. Time sure goes by fast when you are having fun.

As the time went by, we had another good year in projects finished and new ones started. In events planned, put on, and still more planned for the future.

The largest ongoing project is The Grove building improvements. We now have new bathrooms, handicap access, complete new kitchen, new doors and many other improvements. The kitchen is equipped with two refrigerators, several microwaves, a commercial-size gas cooking range, and an exhaust vent. Everything meets code. The facility is now available for rent for family reunions, anniversaries or birthday

parties and whatever else. Lark Thwing either did the work or oversaw it. Many thanks to him.

Our two larger fund raising events, the Tag Sale and the Garden & Artisan Tour were both well planned and executed. We were very pleased with the results, especially since both were held on the same day or weekend as other local town events. Thanks to Beth Thwing for tirelessly heading up the Tag Sale, and Cyndie Stetson for putting together the Garden Tour.

Our next fund raising event will be on October 9, 2011. Alice Parker will lead a "Shape Note" Sing and Dinner at the Meetinghouse and the Grove. Goggle "Shape Notes" and learn all about this fun entertainment.

We received a \$5,000 grant from MassHumanies to fund an Archeological Dig at one of the cellar holes at our "Hawley Old Town Common" site. Senior year students at Mohawk Trail Regional High School will participate. A course at Mohawk will include classes on archeology starting in September, followed by trips to the site thru October. The Dig will be organized and supervised by a doctoral graduate student from Boston University.

Minutes of Annual Meeting August 14, 2011

This Meeting at the Meeting House was called to order at 11 A.M. by President Ray Gotta.

I. The Annual Memorial Service was led by Pastor Bill Thwing. After readings from the Psalms and Ecclesiastes, we sang *O God our help in ages past*. Then we honored the following Sons and Daughters of Hawley who passed away in the past 12 months: Jennifer Holmes, Maida L. Riggs, Stefan Racz, Albert L Gould, Stephen Patlin, Margaret Warriner, Walter DuFresne and Alice Aubrey. Carnations were distributed by Hanna Shrimpton, and memories flowed as relatives and friends paid tribute to these departed Hawleyites. Bill told a brief parable, led us in prayer, and we closed with *America the Beautiful*.

Ray greeted us again for the 111th Annual Meeting., reminding us of our history and purpose.

- II. The Minutes of the August 8, 2010 Annual Meeting were reviewed and accepted.
- III. The Treasurer's Report was given by Serra Root, in excellent detail. The closing balance is \$30,149.00. The Report was accepted as presented.
- IV. The Secretary's Report was given by Alice Parker. She reviewed the monthly meetings of the hard-working Board and their most recent progress: The Old Town Common, and improvements to the Grove building. Our new challenges are 1) Handicap Access for the Meeting House (estimated cost \$34,000); 2) Repair of the Steeple (estimated cost \$33,800); And Improvement of the Front Steps (estimated cost \$1,300.) Of course we will need special fund-raising events to meet these

goals: the first is a Historical SING and DINNER on Sunday October 9, 2011, 3-8pm, led by Alice. She mentioned also the success of our Endowment Fund, which is now over \$20,000. Income from this will support the maintenance of our buildings.

V. Past Year Projects.

Ray spoke about the success of the **Old Town Common** completion, and the winning of an award from the AASLH (American Association for State and Local Histories) Ray and John will travel to VA to accept the award.

Lark gave more details about the **Meetinghouse** projects. Grants have been applied for to support the Handicap Access and the Steeple Repair. The front steps will be done by volunteer labor. He also reviewed the new kitchen and baths at the Grove, where we can now hold winter meetings.

Beth Thwing spoke about the success of the **Tag Sale**, which raised more than \$3,300. Mike Scofield paid for and trucked away all the leftover items. The next one will be in 2013.

Ray gave thanks to Cindy Stetson for the success of the **Garden and Artisans' Tour**, which raised over \$1234, and also to Lark and Beth for the publication of the **Edge of Hawley**, our excellent quarterly Newsletter.

VI. Upcoming Projects and Events

The Fall Schedule includes: Sept. 18, Nature Dinner at Stump Spouts, with Georgette DeFriese; The SING and DINNER October 9, the Apple Fest (TBA); Election Day Baked Goods Sale [Nov 1 or 8?; Hobby Horse Bazaar on Dec 3 and Illumination Party on Dec. 11.

John Sears was not here to talk about the Archeological Dig at the Old Town Common, so Ray told us about the Boston University grad student who will be the overall leader, a U MASS professor who is a technical advisor, and a teacher from the Mohawk Regional School, who will teach the course at Mohawk and lead the 'dig' at the Tavern site. They had hoped for 10 students to sign up for the course – and got 32! Artifacts recovered will be displayed at the Grove.

Ray gave more details about our three building projects. We hope to have the Handicap Access by next year; plans for the ramp, entrance porch and interior changes were posted in the back of the meeting room. Lark has detailed lists of project expenses, for those interested. The funding sources include The Community Foundation of Western Mass., who will be coming soon to inspect the Meetinghouse Handicap Access plans. Another application is to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Community Facilities program.

IX. Closing. Special thanks were given to the many people helping today: registering attendees, donors and servers of food for the Koffee Klatch, salads and desserts, those who clean and keep up the buildings and grounds, helpers with the Raffle and others. Ray asked for people to bring in new members, and generously support our funding drives.

A Collection was taken for the Meetinghouse upkeep and renovation; Fred Kelley recited 'This Old Hat' and the 'Hawley Anagram'; and we closed with an enthusiastic singing of the Hawley Song.

Winners of the great Raffle prizes were drawn and announced, and we adjourned for a picnic lunch in the Grove -- chilly and rainy outside, but warm within with good food and fellowship.

At 1:30 we met again in the Meetinghouse for a "Quilting History in Hawley" talk given by Esther Purinton, with many beautiful examples of local quilts and stories of their makers.

Shape-Note Sing and Dinner

An Old-Fashioned Day in the Country



Save the date--Sunday, October 9--for a journey into the past with a SING and supper high in the hills of Hawley, Massachusetts.

Visit a classic 19th-century country church during New England's most beautiful time of year. The Hawley Meeting House, formerly the East Hawley Church, dates from 1848 and is on the National Historic Registry. Its excellent acoustics render it an ideal setting for making and listening to music.

We will focus on music sung during and around the Civil War in just such spaces, music with a uniquely American sound. In the afternoon composer/conductor Alice Parker will lead participants in singing shape-note hymns from many sources.

In the evening after dinner, Alice Parker and the assembled singers will turn to home songscivil-war music, parlor music, and folk tunes.

The supper between the two periods of music won't be entirely from the 19th century, but it will be a good old-fashioned feast! The meal will be served across the road in the Hawley Grove building.

The main course will be a barbecued pork dinner with traditional side dishes prepared on the spot by <u>Cliff's Smokin' Backyard Barbecue</u>. (A vegetarian alternative will be available upon request.) Hard cider will be provided by Hawley's own <u>Headwater Cider</u>.

Dessert will take the form of a plethora of pies prepared with love by Hawley's excellent home cooks.

Most of the \$40 requested contribution will go toward the restoration of the interior of the Meeting House, which has acquired a number of cracks and creases over the years.


The exterior of the building was beautifully restored for Hawley's bicentennial in 1992. The next scheduled projects include a new handicap entrance and repairs to the steeple. The interior needs extensive work on walls, ceiling, windows, and woodwork.

This work will be undertaken by the building's owners, the Sons & Daughters of Hawley, under the auspices of the Massachusetts Historical Commission, with the cooperation of the Hawley Historical Commission and the town's selectmen. Many local craftsmen are contributing their skills.

Here's what you'll get if you attend the SING:

- * An opportunity to help a worthy nonprofit group restore a lovely old building.
- * A collection of 19th-century songs specially prepared by Alice Parker
- * A chance to make and hear music in an acoustically rich setting, led by the conductor and teacher known as "America's reigning queen of choral music"
- * A visit to an idyllic country spot during the height of its autumn beauty
- * A sumptuous repast

Please join us in Hawley on that special Sunday. Singing will begin at 3 pm, followed by supper at 5:30 and more music at 7 pm.



Most of you who have attended functions at the Meetinghouse know that the front steps are a bit difficult, especially that first big stone step.

We have a plan and have approvals from the building inspector and the Massachusetts Historical Commission (MHC) to add a final stone step and attach a hand rail to make it easier to get up the steps. We looked at several options but decided to turn the first step to the right and left and not to interfere with the carriage landing stone that is in the center of the stone platform. Ladies would alight from their carriages directly onto the center higher stone. It is of historical significance and we don't want to detract from its authenticity. See the sketch included here.

Meetinghouse Handicap Ramp Moves Forward

We have all the approvals we need. We have just submitted a matching grant request to the Community Foundation of Western Massachusetts for a grant to help with the cost, which is estimated at \$34,000. Much of that cost will be met with volunteered services and materials but the carpentry work to build the vestibule and come through the back wall of the meetinghouse will need to be done by a professional carpenter.

We are also preparing a grant application to the USDA for funds to support all three Meetinghouse projects. The ramp, the steeple and the front steps.
